Finding Better Ways to Fight Hunger

The region's largest hunger relief agency and a national leader, Philabundance is moving forward with innovations that will reach even more people more effectively.



1 STRENGTHENING THE HUNGER SAFETY NET

The goal of Philabundance and our member agencies is to ensure that each of the 900,000 people across our region at risk of hunger have a reliable place to turn for help. Unfortunately, those in need can sometimes fall through holes in the safety net. Some areas don't have long enough service hours or the food supply to meet demand. In response, Philabundance is taking strategic action. Among the best weapons in the fight: closer coordination of network agencies, implementing direct service programs, better data to support planning, and constant openness to new ideas.

2 MEETING THE NEED FOR MEALS AND EMPLOYMENT

Since 2000, the Philabundance Community Kitchen has proven the power of an innovative idea: that one program can supply needed meals to emergency kitchens, while also providing hands-on vocational training for adults seeking employment. Looking back on the 10 year anniversary of PCK's inception, we can credit the program with preparing more than 350,000 meals. At the same time, its combination of culinary arts training and life skills workshops prepared 401 low-income men and women for jobs in commercial kitchens. 3 BETTER DATA FOR BETTER DECISIONS

Where is food needed most? How many people do we reach? How are we improving, and how do we need to improve? Answers to questions like these are essential if Philabundance is to fight hunger effectively. To find these answers, we are coordinating with our direct service clients and our 500 member agencies to track and report their activities more systematically. We are analyzing data such as food referral calls and building metrics to gauge progress, identify needs, and allocate resources so that anyone needing food has access.



4 DELIVERING HELP WHERE IT'S NEEDED

A look across the nine-county region that Philabundance serves reveals a complex map of gaps and overlaps. You see neighborhoods in need that are served by a large number of food pantries and other similar neighborhoods served by none at all. Philabundance is pioneering a more systematic approach, based on a measure called the Philabundance Poverty Profile, a means for evaluating levels of need. The first step has been to divide the region into 46 Hunger Catchment Zones, manageable sub-regions that can be analyzed individually and compared. The next step, now in progress, is to identify the extent of need in each zone and team with agencies to reach the underserved and improve operations as well as to implement Philabundance-run food distribution programs.



5 LEARNING FROM THE BEST

As Philabundance works to support our member agencies and build their capacity, we are applying lessons from several of our leading member agencies. To date we have identified five such organizations within our network, designating them our first Flag Food Cupboards. Each has an exceptional track record, serving a large population, providing food variety and customer choice, and maintaining extensive operating hours. We're now working with these Flag agencies to build on their achievements—and to promote their best practices network-wide.

PROFILE OF A LEADER

FOR TRACY HEISLER, OF CENTER CITY, VOLUNTEERING WITH PHILABUNDANCE MEANS NOT ONLY THE CHANCE TO HELP THE HUNGRY, BUT ALSO TO MAKE SATISFYING PERSONAL CONNECTIONS.

Twice a week, usually for a total of 10-12 hours, Tracy pitches in at the Community Food Center at 6th and Lehigh in North Philadelphia, unloading trucks, stocking shelves, and working with families who visit the center.

“I love getting to know the people who come in from week to week,” she says. “At the CFC, you’re not removed from the people you are trying to help—you are right there with them. For me that’s a perfect fit.”

Tracy applies lessons in food merchandising learned through years spent working at Trader Joe’s. This means stocking shelves in appealing ways, guiding the eye to all the choices available—in short, turning a visit to the CFC into an empowering retail experience.

“If we get a new product in, I get excited and tell people about it,” Tracy says. “I encourage them to try things they haven’t before.”

Tracy started volunteering because she was struck by a sense of the disparities in wealth she saw across Philadelphia, and the clear pockets of need. She increased her involvement, she says, when she saw the impact of her efforts and the satisfaction she gained.

“It’s like anything,” she explains. “You enjoy working with the people. You look forward to it. You want to do more.”



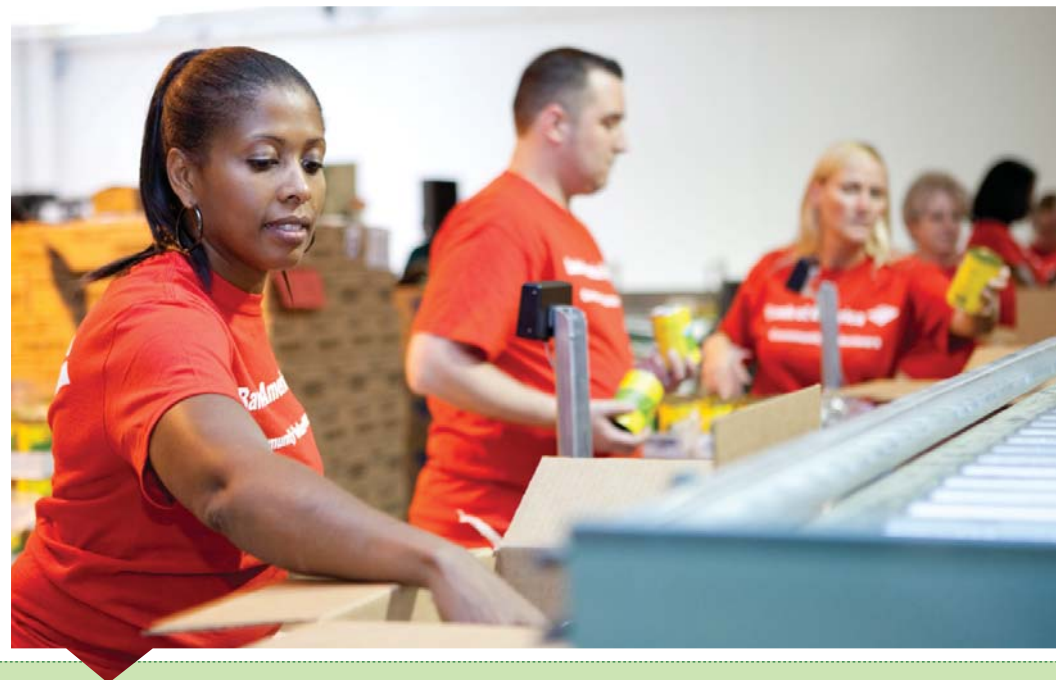
LEADERSHIP MEANS
**Stepping forward
to Volunteer**

When faced with a challenge, there are always some people whose first instinct is step up and do something about it. These are the kind of people who volunteer for Philabundance—15,000 of them annually. At our Hunger Relief Center in South Philadelphia, they sort and pack food for delivery. At our Fresh For All locations and the Community Food Center, they work in person with those in need. Many are part of faith-based groups or employer groups. Others act on their own. In either case, they are the lifeblood of Philabundance, and they make a difference in the lives of 65,000 people every week.

LEADERSHIP MEANS

Committing Essential Resources

By supplying funding, people power, and a range of gifts-in-kind, corporate partners extend our reach and increase our impact.



BANK OF AMERICA One of the world's largest financial institutions, Bank of America is also one of our organization's most committed corporate partners. In 2010, the company presented Philabundance with a grant of \$100,000 to help expand our capacity through the Hunger Relief Center. This investment greatly increased our capability to handle refrigerated food, making it possible to distribute about a million more pounds of fresh produce each year. In addition, an enthusiastic group of Bank of America volunteers lends their efforts at the Hunger Relief Center every month.

WAWA A chain of more than 500 convenience stores across the mid-Atlantic region, Wawa has helped raise both awareness of hunger and substantial funding as a participant in the Check Out Hunger program. Tear-offs at registers allow Wawa shoppers to make donations to their local food banks—donations totaled nearly \$100,000 to Philabundance in 2010. Wawa has led the way as the first convenience store to take part in the Check Out Hunger program and has provided significant direct financial support to the Philabundance Hunger Relief Center as well.



Last year, businesses across the region provided Philabundance with almost **\$1 MILLION** in direct support.

TEVA PHARMACEUTICALS Teva has put its support behind the Philabundance Fresh For All program, an initiative that is essential to our focus on delivering food that is not only filling, but also balanced and nutritious. Like a traveling farmer's market, Fresh For All provides free produce at locations across the region, serving 7,500 people per week. Teva has supported the cost of two of these Fresh For All sites, one in North Philadelphia, and one in Souderton, Montgomery County, both near Teva locations. Teva's support came in the form of a \$125,000 grant, also benefiting other area charitable organizations, made in collaboration with the Philadelphia Eagles.



US AIRWAYS Each month, when 9,000 seniors open food boxes provided through the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)/senior programs, they can thank the USDA for the fruit and pasta—and US Airways for the boxes. Providing these essential containers is just one of many ways the airline supports Philabundance. US Airways is also a steady source of volunteers, an annual financial supporter, and the official airline partner of Philabundance, donating thousands of free miles to allow our staff to travel to conferences and seminars, seeking out new ideas and learning from others committed to fighting hunger.



LEADERSHIP MEANS

Providing Needed Food

In the fight against hunger, leadership can take no more direct and powerful form than supplying food to those in need.

Through our Grocers Against Hunger program, grocery stores across the region donate meat, dairy products, produce, baked goods and other perishables, which Philabundance collects, sorts, and distributes to food cupboards.

Leading the list of participating supermarkets is ACME, our founding partner in the program. With 28 stores participating, ACME has donated more than 2 million pounds of food since they began their partnership with Philabundance—more than any other grocer.

For Philabundance, Grocers Against Hunger is a source for expensive and essential foods, including proteins and fresh produce, and our fastest growing source of food overall. For grocers, it represents a way to keep nutritious but soon to be out-of-date food from going to waste.

PROFILE OF A LEADER

DONORS TO PHILABUNDANCE RANGE FROM THE INSTITUTIONAL TO THE INDIVIDUAL AND REPRESENT A COMPLETE CROSS-SECTION OF THE DELAWARE VALLEY.

Whatever their individual stories, most probably can relate to longtime supporter Mariellen Paulus and the reasons that inspire her to give.

“I have been very fortunate and I want to share my blessings with others,” Mariellen says. “It pains me to know there are hungry people in America, and working at Philabundance is something concrete I can do to help.”

A resident of Horsham, Montgomery County, Mariellen began her involvement as a volunteer 25 years ago with the Greater Philadelphia Food Bank (which

Philabundance merged with in 2005) and she continued off and on over the years, pitching in and making donations.

A decisive point came about a decade ago: “I worked as a volunteer on a hunger census,” she explains. “We went out to different shelters to gather information. For the first time I came face-to-face with foodbank recipients and heard their stories. I realized they were just like me, people I could relate to, and it affected me deeply.”

Today, Mariellen volunteers regularly at the Philabundance Hunger Relief Center and Community Food Center, bringing groups from work and from her church with her, and she continues to make financial commitments.

“I feel moved to be as generous as I can,” she says. “Philabundance is a good organization and spends its money wisely. I can’t imagine a more important cause.”

LEADERSHIP MEANS Energizing People to Act

Our challenge is not only to do all we can to help our neighbors, but to inspire others to join in. Each year, Philabundance partners help us meet this challenge, mobilizing thousands.



EMPTY BOWLS For students at the Alta S. Leary Elementary School in Warminster, Bucks County, an inspired art project offers the chance to grow both in creativity and compassion. In 2010, through the Empty Bowls Benefit and Raffle, 380 students created beautiful ceramic bowls, each bearing a unique design, to be sold at a fundraising dinner benefiting Philabundance. As part of the program, the children, in kindergarten through grade five, learned and talked about ways they could help neighbors in need. In the past two years, the event has raised almost \$14,000 and helped inspire countless future concerned and active community members.

FROM SCHOOL CHILDREN TO TRANSIT PASSENGERS— EVERYONE HAS A ROLE IN ALLEVIATING HUNGER

SEPTA With transit routes spanning 2,200 square miles of southeastern Pennsylvania and an average weekday ridership of more than 1 million, SEPTA can boast a level of visibility across our region that few organizations could match. And it uses this visibility as a powerful asset in the campaign against hunger. SEPTA's annual Stop Hunger at Your Station food drive is a highly effective awareness-raising campaign, involving media coverage, outreach on the part of hundreds of passionate employees, and the hard-to-beat impact of a bus wrapped as a full-color moving billboard. In addition to increased awareness, SEPTA's campaign yielded 19.6 tons of food in 2010, making it one of the year's most successful drives. In 2009, Philabundance celebrated SEPTA for its ongoing commitment with the Harvester of Hope award.



VANGUARD Recognized with the Philabundance Harvester of Hope award in 2010, Vanguard has organized highly successful corporate food drives in each of the past seven years. These drives inspire participation on the part of employees throughout the Malvern-based company. When these employees come together to pack and ship the food they've collected, the event combines superb logistics with a spirit of celebration. Last year, Vanguard's efforts brought in over 13 tons of food, allowing Philabundance to provide 81,000 meals.

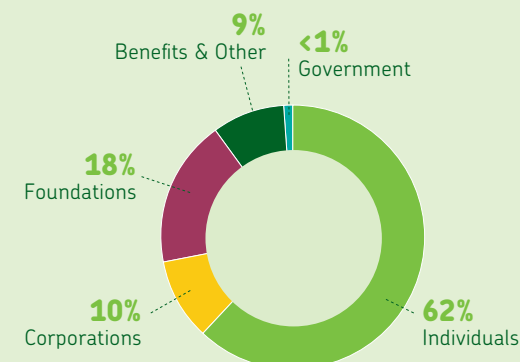

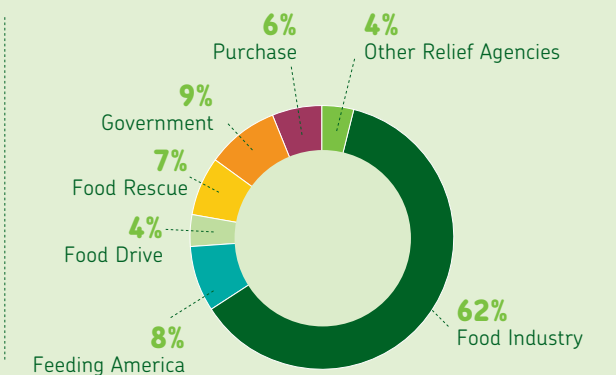

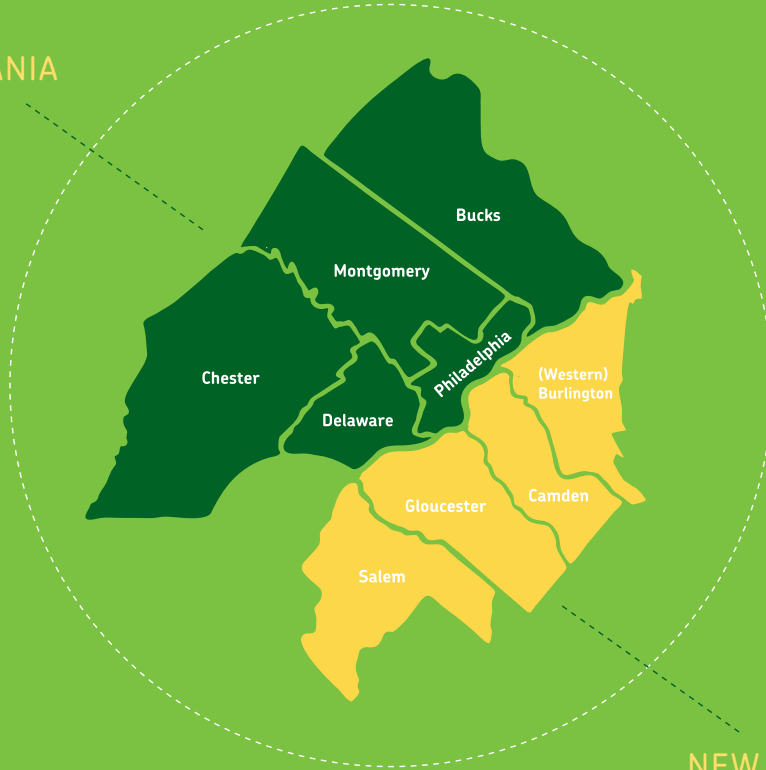
